### Rationale of the Workshop

The <u>Future of vocational education and training (VET)</u> project, covering the 27 EU Member States as well as Iceland, Norway and the UK, aims at contributing to a better overall understanding of the challenges and opportunities facing European VET in the coming years. It does so by different activities, original research work, events and workshops.

This workshop brings together academic experts in the field of Vocational Education and Training in order to discuss findings from the project and related research.

The aims of this workshop are

- to further develop the comparative methodologies for VET research created within the project and discuss theoretical approaches to comparative VET research
- to share evidence on changes in VET qualifications, curricula and institutions (including CVET) and discuss their relation to Cedefop's basic VET scenarios for 2030 (pluralistic, distinctive and special purpose VET)
- to initiate new research co-operation and contribute to the further development of the VET research agenda on the European level.

These three objectives form the basis of the agenda presented here, which consists of plenary sessions and three in-depth workshop discussions on "Comparing VET systems and curricula", "Trends and Responsiveness: Changes in VET delivery" and "The changing world of work and the future role of VET/CVET".

### Session 1: Comparing VET systems and curricula

This session looks at the methodological concepts of Cedefop's Future of VET projects, the three-perspective model, the analytical framework and the scenarios developed. In particular, it deals with methods that allow to adequately reflect the diverse specifics of vocational curricula and vocational teaching and learning forms in a comparative approach including implicit forms of learning and knowing. The following questions are addressed by individual contributions:

What are the potentials and limits of Cedefop's analytical framework for comparative VET research? How can the content/knowledge in VET curricula be best compared? Do implicit learning and knowing deserve special attention? Is an international classification of vocational knowledge possible, and what would be its benefit? Is there a need for a genuine theory of comparative VET research?

# Session 2: Trends and Responsiveness – Changes in VET delivery

This session looks at changes in the content of VET, including VET providers' and firms' perspectives. The ongoing project carried out a provider survey that will be presented here. This covered a number of questions including changes in programme design and provision, but also co-operation with the regional economy and economic and administrative drivers of change. Hence, what is happening on the provider level is as relevant as changes in companies' recruitment and training objectives. These will be reflected in two designated presentations that look at responses by firms in regard to emerging competence needs and changes in recruitment and training patterns.

What emphasis is given to general subjects and transversal skills in programmes and qualifications? How is the vocational curriculum implemented? How does it integrate with academic and general education content? Will we see more hybrid institutions? Will future changes be driven more by educational or economic goals? What are the changes in terms of recruitment needs and skills requirements on the shop floor? How can such changes be recognized? What are the changes that can be observed in terms of training practices and work- based learning in firms? Are (formal) feedback mechanism between VET and the labour market changing? Do they need to change, and if so how?

# Session 3: The changing world of work and the future role of VET/CVET

This session looks at learning over the life course and how this is facilitated by IVET and CVET institutions. This includes a discussion of the role and the forms of initial and continuing vocational education and training from the individual as well as institutional perspectives, and a reflection on how professional/vocational knowledge is challenged by current technological developments such as digitalization.

How has the relationship between IVET and CVET changed in the past 25 years and how will it change in the future? How are changes at work and within sectors challenging this relationship within VET systems? How are learning careers experienced and shaped by individual learners? How to adapt to changing skills requirements and avoid skills decay within a changing world of work?
